Achieving equitable and optimal healthcare through primary care for all.


MISSION

PAST

Congress awarded MSM \$7.5 million in 1997 to establish NCPC, making the Center the first congressionally-sanctioned center to develop programs focusing on the intersection between the primary care system and health equity. This major public health milestone was possible thanks to the efforts of Dr. Louis Sullivan, the former Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and President Emeritus of MSM. NCPC's unique lens brought together a diverse and interdisciplinary group of professionals focused on community-oriented prevention and primary care for low-income, minority, and other underserved populations. Over the past 25 years, we have established our voice in the national health equity conversation through strong partnerships, innovative research, and a wide range of programming.

NCPC has addressed primary care needs across many aspects of the system. Some examples of our work and impact include:



PRESENT

NCPC currently carries out its mission through three distinct divisions and several strategic initiatives. Together, the divisions and initiatives advance health equity by identifying gaps in our nation's primary care infrastructure and addressing those gaps through educational programming, policy advisory, technical assistance, resource dissemination, and community engagement. NCPC targets its resources to healthcare systems, healthcare providers, and community-based organizations.

Health Policy and Research Division



The Health Policy and Research Division serves two key functions. The Division evaluates and informs policies that advance health equity by ensuring a strong primary care system. It also conducts community-relevant research that measures the impact of the primary care system, aiming to improve health and health equity through innovative analytic approaches and practice-based research. The Health Policy and Research Division evaluates work both within NCPC and across the nation.

Health Information Technology Division



National COVID Resiliency Network (NCRN)

NCPC was the sole awardee of the

\$40 MILLION

National Infrastructure for Mitigating the Impact of COVID-19 within Racial and Ethnic Minority Communities (NIMIC) Initiative grant,

a three-year co-operative agreement between MSM and the Human and Health Services Office of Minority Health. Mobilizing quickly, the NCRN initiative created a multi-cultural, multi-lingual network of community-based organizations to address the impact of COVID in their communities. To assist CBOs and residents in accessing culturally and linguistically relevant COVID-19 information and resources and other health and social needs, NCRN created a technology based community engagement platform connecting communities across states, tribes and territories to health and social service resources and information.

The NCRN Platform is a diverse, multicultural, multilingual tool that employs a community engagement platform for disseminating actionable health information nationwide.

Global Health Initiatives

As part of the Historic Black Colleges and Universities Global Health Consortium,

NCPC contributes to the Joint United Nations Program on HIV/AIDS through training Zambian healthcare workers in high-burden clinical settings. NCPC leads the implementation of gold-standard telemedicine in Zambia and Malawi.

Faculty Development Program

the Faculty Development Program has supported medical school faculty of color through programming for clinical teaching, scholarship, and leadership skills. This Program ensures that there is a pool of

highly trained and culturally competent primary care faculty and practitioners who are dedicated to addressing the needs of underserved communities in the delivery of health services.
